KEY POINTS – SUMMARY

- 1. 22% below normal rainfall
- 2. Violation of <u>SWRCB Order</u> = fines could reach several million dollars potentially to be paid by ratepayers
- 3. May 2005 usage exceeded May target by over 200 acre feet
- 4. <u>Historically</u> water usage in July, August and September have been over the targets
- 5. Outdoor watering is culprit and target of these proposed new rates:
 - > golf courses
 - > public authority
 - residential properties with large irrigated acreage
- 6. Over 90% of residential customers will not be affected
- 7. New rate temporary -- to October 31, 2004
- 8. No windfall or advantage to Cal-Am -- all revenue from these new rates go into special account either to be returned to all ratepayers and/or to pay any SWRCB fine
- 9. No effective alternative; must change behavior on use of outside watering
- 10. Cal-Am will also file a CPUC application for a moratorium on all new and expanded connections
